Sue Cobey will be presenting at the North Olympic Peninsula Bee Association (NOPBA)at the Port Angeles Library in Port Angeles on Sunday, Feb. 9th at 12:30 PM. This should be a rewarding talk for anyone interested in a scientific approach to bee research.

Sue Cobey is a lifetime bee researcher who managed several honey bee research labs, including those at UC Davis and Ohio State University (one of her students being Dave Noble who talked to our club in Sept.). She has also worked at the USDA Honey Bee Lab, Baton Rouge, and in commercial queen rearing production in Florida and California. She is probably best known for her development of the New World Carniolan strain of bees that many of us use. She is also involved in importing germ plasma (bee sperm) from several strains to try to diversify the genetic's of American bee lines.

If you missed the fair, here is your chance to appreciate all the work that went into making it successful. Displays will be set up for your viewing.


Bring your favorite HONEY DESSERTS to share with the club. and A SAMPLE OF YOUR 2019 HONEY for our honey tasting.

Introduction to QUEEN REARING Mating: Some stats Mating flights: Queens -680F /> 0.7mi from hive /2:30-4:00 true local time Drones -640F /< 0.6mi from hive /2-5 true local time

When requeening:

- 1.Order a new queen 2.3-4 days before new queen arrives, find and cage old queen 3.Switch out cages (old for new)
- 1.Queens are 'introduced' into the brood nest surrounded by nurse bees. 2.Pheromone (queen and brood) levels remain somewhat constant.

The Problem with walk away splits: •Daughter queens CANNOT change/improve genetics •Longer brood breaks →impact population; •Poor quality queens emerge first (diet and timing)

#### WINTER HEATHER

Winter Heathers give our honey bees a good sourse of nectar and pollen during the winter months, when not too much is available for them.

Some heathers require alkaline soil, but the winter heaths, Erica x darleyensis, Erica Erigena and Erica camea grow in all soil types, and in full sun or partial shade, as long as their roots are not constantly waterlogged.

It's so wonderful, in the middle of winter to see our "girls," on a sunny day, foraging their little hearts out gathering that much needed fresh nectar and pollen.

- \*Many beekeepers are now using fondant boards with a quilt board above to give food, ventilation and insulation for their colonies during the winter months.
